

Not so long ago, Miami's daily newspapers declared war on homosexual "perverts"



In the early morning hours of August 3, 1954, a North Miami couple visiting a lovers' lane off Biscayne Boulevard near NE 135th Street discovered the body of young man lying in a pool of blood.

The North Miami Police Department found the victim's 1950 cream-colored Chevrolet convertible several hundred yards away, with bloodstains on the front seat and a .22-caliber bullet casing on the floor. The victim had been shot in the torso and bled to death as he staggered from the car and then collapsed. His wallet was missing, and the footprints of a barefoot man led away from the crime scene toward Arch Creek.

Starting with the car's registration and initials inside the victim's University of Kentucky class ring, police confirmed his identity as that of an Eastern Air Lines steward, William Theodore Simpson. He was 27 years old, had worked for Eastern since joining its Miami-based flight-attendant training program in 1951, and had returned to Miami the previous night from Detroit. He had stopped off briefly at his rented apartment in the 2200 block of NE 4th Avenue and left around 10:00 p.m.

Philadelphia, Feb. 27 -- Secretary of State Dulles warned yesterday that Russian aims had not changed under a "new look" foreign policy. He said the United States could defeat these aims only after a program of continued and expanded economic aid to every country.

In a major speech at the Philadelphia Business Forum, Dulles said this country's basic policy is to try to hasten the day when Russia will be governed by "men who put the welfare of the Russian people above world conquest."

Don't Panic
He described the "new look" Russian policy as emphasizing "mutual cooperation with leading countries, whom they formerly detested," and putting heavy stress on trade and economic assistance for less developed countries.

Noting that this policy had won for Russia "a considerable popular revival" in some Asian and African countries, the secretary of state declared emphatically "we need not be panicked."

Part of the answer to the new Soviet threat, he said, is for Congress to grant authority asked by the administration to commit about 100 million dollars a year for several years towards long-range economic development projects in Soviet target countries.

100 Million More
He said also that the government needs about 100 millions more in new money this year than it obtained last year to help counter the Russian campaign.

In calling now for greater loyalty in U.S. foreign spending, Dulles

Homosexuals are appearing openly again in Greater Miami and making money for the operators of clubs which cater to them.

Several hundred -- possibly more than 1,000 -- are here this winter and have found that the heat is off from a public protest campaign less than two years ago.

Word now is going back up north that Miami has lifted the barriers once more.

A three-week survey by The Miami News showed that the pervert colony is flocking back in the same places raved of consistently during the "purge" of 1964.

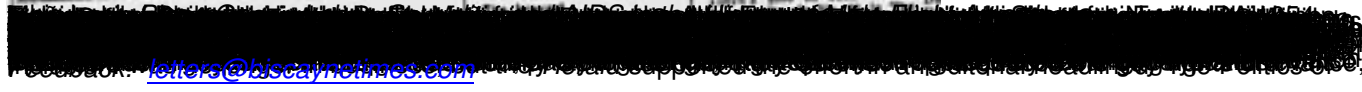
